The Current State of Ministry

In August 2021 809 member respondents answered questions about the state of youth ministry. These are their stories.



ETHNICITY

A majority of our membership is white/Caucasian while minority groups represent 20% of the membership.



EDUCATION

79% of our members have at least completed a college degree.
33% of the sample have completed an undergraduate and 46% have completed a graduate degree or higher.



YEARS IN MINISTRY

A majority of our members have done ministry for ten years or more (65%).



CURRENT ROLE IN MINISTRY

Although many ministers have experienced changes in responsibilities and role, 81% of ministers who responded stated they will stay in their current role.



MINISTRY CAPACITY

Compared to last year, ministers serve more in a part-time and full-time capacity rather than as a volunteer.



SALARY RANGE

Even though 46% have an advanced degree and 65% have more than 10 years of experience, 71% make less than \$50,000.



INTEREST IN GENERAL MINISTRY TOPICS

Interest in youth development and parents and families continue to be a priority for ministers. This year, there is more emphasis on understanding social trends with a continued focus on prayer, spirituality, social justice, and service.



LEVEL OF CONCERN ABOUT MINISTRY ISSUES

Ministers are most concerned about parent and youth participation along with polarization in the Church, recruiting volunteers, and ministry during the pandemic.

MEMBER TYPE: Associate

Tell us a bit about yourself.

I love teaching, talking about faith, and working with children, teens, and adults. My dream job is to lead a team of innovative thinkers to build communities that help individuals and families grow in faith. At this time, I am focused especially on how parents raise their children as faith-filled people. I believe that I am being called to work with others to unite best practices of Catholic school education, faith formation, and homeschool to build up the domestic church and create mission-focused communities. I want to create communities of formation and mission—connect households within neighborhoods to work for good.

How has being a member of NFCYM helped you and your ministry to young people?

NFCYM is a great asset to all involved in youth ministry. Participating in professional development, especially in these last few months, has enabled me to stay connected to conversations about the best practices in the field. Youth, parents, and volunteer leaders have also benefited through attending NCYC. In addition to the actual conference, preparing for an experience like NCYC helps the whole group to grow spiritually and as a community during the preparation time.

What does accompaniment mean to you, and how has NFCYM accompanied you?

To accompany is to walk with. I think of the story of the Road to Emmaus and how Jesus walks with, listens, and discusses in a way that opens hearts. NFCYM has focused on sharing best practices and research to inform action. In this more distanced time, NFCYM has continued to bring people into conversation with one another to share the hopes and struggles of ministry.

Why ministry? Why do you do what you do?

I have been called to use my gifts at the service of the mission of the Church, to help form people in faith and draw them closer to life in Christ.



If you could share one thing with other ministers, parents, families, and clergy, that you have learned throughout your experience ministering, what would it be?

You are the "tool" with which you minister. This phrase from one of my graduate classes became very real to me as I found that it was necessarily to prioritize my own spiritual growth, healthy marriage, and family life in order to best minister to and with others in a professional way.

Tell us a bit about yourself.

Born and raised in Lebanon, in 2004, I became a certified physical therapist. Not being able to deny God's calling, I joined the Maronite Missionaries in 2007. I was ordained a priest in 2014 and moved to Houston in 2016 as assistant pastor of Our Lady of the Cedars. In 2020, I was appointed national director of the Office of Maronite Youth. On May 8, 2021, I received my MBA.



How has being a member of NFCYM helped you and your ministry to young people?

Being new to this country and position, I needed all the help I could get in finding resources and help from experts. NFCYM offered me access to many resources, conferences, and experts who helped me better understand the reality of our youth ministry in the United States and helped me find ideas and form a strong youth program for our diocese.

What is your relationship with NFCYM? What does accompaniment mean to you, and how has NFCYM accompanied you?

I have been a member of this organization since 2020. I regularly join the regional meetings and participate in different conferences and Momentums. Accompaniment, to me, means that someone is at my side helping guide me and give me advice along the way. NFCYM has done just that. Tell us a bit about yourself.

I am the director of youth ministry for the Diocese of Fort Wayne-South Bend and a 2015 graduate of the University of Notre Dame in theology and American studies. Since beginning diocesan ministry in 2017, I have helped establish leadership opportunities for youth and youth ministers to enable them to make an impact in their local communities. I have also brought the church's love of the young to life through establishing an annual celebration of World Youth Day at the diocesan level. Prior to diocesan ministry, I was the director of religious education and youth ministry at Old St. Patrick Catholic Church in Ann Arbor, Michigan.



I have an enthusiasm for hands-on ministry that has involved incorporating intergenerational ministry, parish-wide events as well as pilgrimages and programming that bring young people in touch with the beauty, truth, and goodness of their faith and communities.

I am an avid athlete who competed in USA Cycling's Professional Road Tour, but now as a husband and father, I enjoy being outdoors with my wife, Valerie, and son, Joseph. Together we go out on tandem bike rides, visits to the zoo, and walks around our neighborhood in Fort Wayne.

How has being a member of NFCYM helped you and your ministry to young people?

It has enabled me to build friendships and professional networks that have supported my ministry. One of the best things I have experienced with NFCYM is the New Diocesan Director's Institute. It was at this point after sixteen months on the job, that I finally felt I was learning what I was supposed to be doing for ministry at the diocesan level.

What is your relationship with NFCYM? What does accompaniment mean to you, and how has NFCYM accompanied you?

I serve as the internal coordinator for Region 7 (Wisconsin, Illinois, and Indiana). In this position, I have the privilege to bring together members to discuss ministry in our area and to try to support and accompany those who are new to ministry. Why ministry? Why do you do what you do?

There is nothing more compelling than witnessing a young person who has devoted their life completely to Jesus Christ.

If you could share one thing with other ministers, parents, families, and clergy, that you have learned throughout your experience ministering, what would it be?

Young people want to be able to be active leaders in the faith. So many "service" opportunities seem to simply be doing what everyone else has done. Finding creative ways for young people to have leadership roles that really matter is a great way to grow engagement in the faith. Learn to delegate and invite others to use their gifts for the glory of God. That is when ministry takes flight.

NFCYM members can ask me about . . .

How to find the courage to pick up the phone and call someone else to ask how they are doing and to ask them for advice. These conversations have been really fruitful for me, and I know they would be beneficial for others as well. Also, anyone who loves the mountains and cycling, I would be happy to share my enthusiasm for these great ways to celebrate the outdoors.

Anything else you want to mention?

It seems to me that the only stance that is truly Catholic is one that adequately addresses all aspects of Catholic Social Teaching. I am challenging myself to grow in areas that I am not well-versed in. Can we say we are Catholic if we do not hear the cries of those affected by racism, abortion, immigration, the death penalty, gender ideology, and the environment?
